Off-Highway Vehicle Guide and Places to Ride in New Mexico



OHVs in New Mexico

The New Mexico Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Act of 2005 and subsequent legislation in 2009 were designed to protect the safety of OHV users and ensure responsible and sensitive use of OHVs on public lands.

What is an Off-Highway Vehicle?

New Mexico defines an off-highway vehicle as an all-terrain vehicle (ATV), dirt bike, off-road vehicle (ORV, UTV, mule-type vehicle), or snowmobile.

Registration and Use Permits

- **New Mexico residents** must have their OHVs registered with the state Motor Vehicle Division to legally operate their vehicles on public lands. **Registration is \$50 every two years** (\$53 for initial registration and \$50 thereafter).
- **Nonresidents** whose OHVs are not registered or are currently in compliance with another state's off-highway vehicle registration, user fee or similar rule demonstrated by certificate of registration must obtain a use permit to legally operate on public lands in New Mexico. **Permits cost \$48 for two years or \$18 for 90 days.** They are available at www.B4uRide.com, www.wildlife.state.nm.us, any Department of Game and Fish Office, or by calling 505-476-8140.

Vehicles Exempt From Registration or Permits

- Motorcycles registered for use on public streets.
- Vehicles used strictly for agricultural use.
- Vehicles used strictly on private land.

Youth Safety Requirements

- Riders younger than age 6 may not operate an ATV on public land.
- Riders younger than age 18 must:
 - ♦ complete a certified OHV safety course and obtain a safety permit.
 - ♦ wear an approved, securely fastened helmet and safety goggles.
 - ♦ never carry a passenger, even on OHVs designed for two persons.
 - ♦ be visually supervised by an adult when operating an OHV unless they are age 13 and older with a valid motorcycle license or age 15 and older with a valid driver's license.
 - ♦ ensure the all-terrain vehicle (ATV) or recreational off-highway vehicle (ROV) is an age-appropriate size-fit vehicle as established by rule of the department.
- Approved safety courses include New Mexico online safety courses or hands-on training by the ATV Safety Institute, 800-887-2887 or www.atvsafety.org. Some training courses in other states are accepted in New Mexico, and many OHV dealers include free safety training with each OHV purchase. Respect the Lands

Much of New Mexico is designated as public land and administered for multiple uses. In the right places, and managed carefully, motor vehicles are an appropriate use of national forests and grasslands, when it is done in accordance with the agency's travel management regulations. Motorized off-highway vehicle use is appropriate when it is done in a responsible and safe manner. And thanks to New Mexico's new Off-Highway Motor Vehicle Act, recreational pursuits have never been safer.

The Department encourages responsible recreational use of our public lands, use that leaves the land healthy and unspoiled, that protects our traditional uses, customs and culture, wildlife and wildlife habitat, and allows for the continued enjoyment of these lands for our families and future generations.

Please be considerate of the other users of our lands including ranchers and their livestock, private landowners, wildlife, hikers and mountain bikers. Use the proper equipment that will keep you and your children as safe as possible while riding.

Equipment Requirements


- **Safety helmets.** All off-highway motor vehicle operators and passengers under the age of eighteen (18) shall wear safety helmets that comply with the state and federal safety standards (visit www.B4uRide.com for more information).
- **Eye protection.** Unless the off-highway motor vehicle has a protective windscreen, all off-highway motor vehicle operators and passengers under the age of eighteen must wear eye protection that meets or exceeds the Vehicle Equipment Safety Standards Regulations VESC-8 (visit www.B4uRide.com for more information) and more generally known as safety glasses or safety goggles. Additionally, the protective eyewear must be free of scratches, give a clear view to both sides and be fastened securely.

The Travel Management Rule requires each national forest and grassland to designate those national forest system roads, trails, and areas open to motor vehicle use by class of vehicle and time of year. Designated routes and areas will be identified on a motor vehicle use map (MVUM). Once routes have been designated and identified on a MVUM, motor vehicle use off the designated system is prohibited. It is the responsibility of the forest visitor to obtain a copy of the MVUM (available from Forest Service websites and offices) and comply with the designations.

Prohibited Uses on Public Lands

It is illegal for any person to use an OHV:

- in a careless, reckless or negligent manner so as to endanger the person or property of another.
- while under the influence of intoxicating liquor or drugs.
- while in pursuit of and with intent to hunt or take a species of animal or bird protected by law.
- in pursuit of or harassment of livestock in any manner that negatively affects the livestock's condition.
- on or within an earthen tank or other structure meant to water livestock or wildlife, unless the off-highway motor vehicle is on a route designated by the landowner or land management agency as an off-highway motor vehicle route.
- in a manner that has a direct negative effect on or interferes with persons engaged in agricultural practices.
- in excess of 10 miles per hour within 200 feet of a business, animal shelter, horseback rider, bicyclist, pedestrian, livestock or occupied dwelling.
- unless in possession of the person's registration certificate or nonresident permit.
- unless the vehicle is equipped with a spark arrester approved by the Forest Service, provided that a snowmobile is exempt from this provision.
- when conditions such as darkness limit visibility to 500 feet or less, unless the vehicle is equipped with a headlight and tail light.
- that produces noise that exceeds 96 decibels.
- where off-highway motor vehicle traffic is prohibited under local, state or federal rules or regulations.

Penalties

Fines range from \$71 for a first violation to \$450 for repeat violations.


Riding Responsibly on Designated Areas or Routes

- Know before you go. Contact the local Forest Service, Bureau of Land Management or other appropriate agency office to find out about trails, roads and areas open to OHV use.
- It is your responsibility to obtain permission to travel across private lands.
